International Symposium at the University of Western Australia: 11/23
Emotions and Intimacy in Asian Migration, Past and Present

Hosted by Susan Broomhall

An emotions approach to contemporary and historical societies in East Asia, and specifically in their migration experiences, is a largely under-researched area. This symposium focused on emotions a wide range of feelings shared within, and about, intimate relationships in the Asian region, as people move and moved across the region in migration, and considered how emotional experiences and ideas circulate through varied media, material and cultural exchanges. The symposium allowed for fruitful exchange among scholars from a wide range of fields to share their knowledge and to identify important points of contact between our research specialisms.



Sociology of emotion

- Way in which emotion is socially patterned
- 'how emotions, particularly through their management and their expression, serve to reproduce the society in which individuals are embedded.' (Lively, 2016)
- Emotional energy is the main motivating force in social life (Randall Collins)
- Shott (1979) emotions result from physiological arousal and labelling of that affect. Guilt, Shame, Embarrassment, Pride, Vanity, Empathy
- Cultural differences in understanding and expressing emotions – a factor in relationships (studies show females discouraged from anger; males from fear; different cultural orientations to happiness, sadness, jealousy, excitedness, disgust etc)

In addition, Dr Yin Wang (National Cheng Kung University) and Professor Lynne Nakano (The Chinese University of Hong Kong) joined with Professor Broomhall to present an afternoon masterclass for advanced students working on topics related to emotions, migration and multiculturalism in Asia. Students shared their research findings and received feedback from the group, as they explored questions, theories and ideas around these complex topics.

Marriage Migrants in Asia: Mobility and Agency

During the past decades, the intra-Asia flows of cross-border marriage migration have increased rapidly, particularly between Southeast Asia and East Asia. Interdisciplinary and comparative approaches concerning cross-border marriages in Asian region are much needed. This book explores why and how marriage migration may offer routes to empower women. Because of the unequal gender relations in the commodification of transnational marriage, marriage migrants are often confined in the private sphere. However, with expanding communal relations and diverse responsibilities, they gradually move from private to public spaces including community, labor market, and social groups.



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When they enter multiple public spaces, marriage migrants cross back and forth between private and public spheres by making good use of economic, cultural and social capitals. They are no longer limited by their identity as marriage migrants, but under limited conditions, they have become family supporters, strategists, or social agents that make agency and mobility possible. With interdisciplinary perspectives, the contributors will address the following questions: how do marriage migrant women make good use of economic, cultural and social capitals to make their agency and mobility possible? How are their identities re-shaped when they enter multiple private and public spaces in the host societies? How do they represent themselves to challenge public misconceptions about themselves? The collection of essays focuses on marriage migrant women's agency, mobility, survival strategies, mechanisms of identity construction, and integration into the receiving society.
